Centered on this hillside is the unfinished building we are seeking to secure for the future MACU-Rwanda Campus. We need \$50,000 down payment to secure the property and building. Then \$265,000 would complete the purchase/construction and get us ready to furnish the campus. This plan includes renting six units on the street level to businesses, creating a sustainable path for overhead expenses of MACU-Rwanda. This is by far the best deal we have found in Kigali.

Crisis in Rwanda

It is impossible to realize all the implications of the COVID-19 pandemic around the world. Closing one business has some implications. Closing almost all businesses results in multiple ripples which are hard to comprehend. The immediate issues in the US are difficult, but I will assure you, the complications in a country like Rwanda is much more severe. I am reminded of the Great Depression. It was a difficult time, but normally it was harder for those who lived in the city. My grandparents had no money. However, because they lived on a farm, they had food to eat.

COVID-19 has created a crisis for many in Rwanda. The streets are empty. Public transportation is closed. People are restricted to their homes and must call the police before going to the market. Life is difficult for those living in rural areas, but most of them have something to eat. They are limited by items like cooking oil. Those living in the city are having a harder time "making a life." Most city dwellers have no garden and no money. They have little to no food.

I am aware of a few missions and churches helping with the need. Rwanda Challenge has started an emergency fund and provided some help the last three weeks.

Message from Theophile: "Hello Frank we shared the \$500 to 17 pastors and 13 from Next generation in total 30 family. When we called Havugaimana J Bosco he cried, it was 3 days without eating with his family."

Dilemmas in Practical Ministry

Life is filled with choices; some are easy, some are hard. The two needs just presented are difficult for me. The immediate need is to provide for a brother or sister in crisis (James 2:14-17). But are there opportunities which are more immediate than helping the poor (Matthew 26:6-13)?

Right now I am torn between my friends in crisis because of the COVID-19 shutdown in Rwanda versus the need to provide an affordable associate degree in Bible/theology (required by law) for the future of the Rwandan Church. For me, I cannot choose between the two. I will do both.

I am reminded of one of the sayings of my seminary professor, James Strauss - "Do something, even if it's wrong." My interpretation: take a step, do something. It might not be the perfect decision, but at least do something.

God, help us to care enough to do something.
